

Ansophie Enslin Assistant Manager: Human Capital Management (HCM) (Payroll Specialist)

1. Tell us about yourself; and, when did you join Umalusi? I joined Umalusi as a temporary employee through SAGE (VIP) on 1 November 2012 and was permanently employed by Umalusi on 1 April 2013. I am a bit of a go-getter and punctuality is of great importance to me.

2. What does your role entail? The essence of my role is to ensure that all staff, including new employees, receive their salary on a monthly basis and that it is correct. I reconcile and submit the EMP201 and the

payment to South African Revenue Services (SARS) monthly and I am responsible for the bi-annual and annual reconciliations to SARS, when IRP5s are issued to each employee and submitted for assessments. I also ensure that medical aid contributions deducted from salaries, as well as other deductions, are paid over on time. I am also responsible for reporting "injuries on duty". I submit the forms to the Workmen's Compensation Commissioner, submit the annual returns on earnings and effect payments for approval. I issue the contracts for independent contractors when due and on request from the business units, to ensure the validity of payments. I help the auditors with payroll information and assist Ms Selesho, my Senior Manager, with any tasks she assigns to me.

3. How does your work and the role of your unit contribute to the overall work of the organisation? I think that the HCM (or Human Resources Development and Management (HRD&M) Unit plays an extremely big role in any organisation. It is important to know the laws that we are governed by, which affect our daily work. If I do not know the different laws, I will not be able to perform my function to full capacity.

4. How has your experience working for Umalusi been so far? It has been a joyful experience and I have learnt so much, not only with regard to my work but the people, too. Through the years I have met and worked with the greatest people and they have all enriched my life.

1. Tell us about yourself; and, when did you join

I started at Umalusi in June 2014 as a subject specialist for Foundation Phase and was appointed as a member of the E&A IS sub-unit evaluation team. 2. What does your role entail? I assist with the implementation, maintenance and review of an

accreditation and monitoring system for private providers of education and training and maintain and improve provider and stakeholder relationships. I also quality-assure various reports in respect of the accreditation, monitoring and evaluation system for private education institutions. I conduct ongoing general administration in support of the system of accreditation, monitoring and evaluation of private education institutions. An important role is promoting quality among constituent providers.

3. How does your work and the role of your unit contribute to the overall work of the organisation? It contributes to the quality assurance process of independent schools, which are legal entities registered

contributes to the quality assurance process of independent schools, which are legal entities registered through the provincial departments of education, to ensure that quality teaching and learning takes place consistently. Registered institutions are held accountable for the quality of teaching and learning and set high standards, as Grade 12 results should be on par or above the national average. The unit, and I, promote high standards and quality among constituent providers. We encourage communication and sharing of information across South African borders to strengthen Umalusi's quality assurance system.

4. How has your experience working for Umalusi been so far? It has taught me to use the knowledge I have and to build on it, through implementing internal policies and legislation. It has also strengthened my ethical standards. It has been challenging in the sense that the organisational culture is extremely stringent in every area of what we do, so I must constantly upgrade my knowledge because I am accountable to the South African community. The unit provides research-based justification and support for the management of the General and Further Education and Training Sub-Framework of qualifications.
