

## Profiles of the **Speakers**



### Dr Mafu Rakometsi Umalusi CEO

Dr Rakometsi has a career spanning 40 years in education. He has served as a teacher, lecturer, Head of Department at a college of education, and subject adviser. He was head of Examinations in the North West Province and later became Chief Director of Curriculum and Examinations. In 2004 he rose to the position of Superintendent General (Director-General) for Education in the Free State. Dr Rakometsi has been the Chief Executive Officer of Umalusi since 2009.



### **Professor Yunus Ballim** Chairperson of the 6th Umalusi Council

Professor Yunus Ballim is the former Deputy Vice Chancellor - Academic and the Vice-Principal of the University of the Witwatersrand, and the founding Vice-Chancellor of the Sol Plaatjie University (SPU) in Kimberley, which opened in 2014. Professor Ballim graduated from Wits with a Bachelor of Science degree in Civil Engineering, a Master of Engineering and a PhD degree in Civil Engineering. His research is mainly in Cement and Concrete Materials Science. He has served on a number of local and international Technical Committees in his research fields. He was appointed as a member of the fifth Umalusi Council in June 2018 and returned as the Chairperson of the 6th Umalusi Council in June 2022.

Dr Eva Sujee is currently the Executive Manager: Quality Assurance and Monitoring at Umalusi, the Quality Council for General and Further Education and Training. Before joining Umalusi in 2017, Dr Sujee occupied the position of Deputy Director: Research at the South African Qualifications Authority (SAQA). Her research field is in languages, specifically the use of technology to differentiate in a language classroom. She was the Global Innovation Awards Winner for the Africa & Middle East region for Turnitin (student engagement category) in 2016. She holds a Higher Diploma in Education IV, BA (Cum Laude), B Ed, MBA from North West University and PhD from the University of Pretoria.

### Ms Cindy Thomas Senior Manager: Evaluation and Accreditation

Ms Cindy Thomas is currently the Senior Manager: Evaluation and Accreditation at Umalusi, the Quality Council for General and Further Education and Training. She joined Umalusi in February 2014 as the Team Leader of the team of evaluators responsible for accreditation of Independent Schools. She was appointed the Manager responsible for Evaluation and Accreditation of Independent Schools in September of that same year. Welcome Message


## by Umalusi CEO
